#### In Memoriam: Ronald (Ron) Craig

Ron Craig passed away on August 24. He was a foundational member of AMPS-CV and was also active in IPMS Richmond. Ron was from Pennsylvania and as a young man served in the U.S. Army Signal Corps. Ron then moved to Virginia with his wife Kathleen and raised two sons, Scott and Douglas. He was a historian and modeler of Eastern Front WW2 subjects, especially the Soviet T-26 and T-34. Ron was not afraid to build obscure model conversions but was not impressed with photo-etched brass details. He didn't bother entering model contests because we was perfectly happy building for himself and sharing them at our meetings. 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#### Last Month's Demonstration: Making Soft Stowage from Two-Part Epoxy Putty

Making your own soft stowage enables a perfect fit to any model you are working without having to wait for an aftermarket manufacturer to offer a set. It also means your stowage will be unique and therefore more accurate when compared to others. Here are notes from Ashley's demo.


#### Hardware

- Dental tool assortment: Ashley divides the tools into four rough categories - pointed, curved, chisel and shaping. You will only need 3-4 tools to make the stowage.
- Single-edge razor blade
- Scale ruler: it's important to make your stowage to the scale of your model. Use a scale ruler to save you from doing the math on calculator.
- Acrylic sheet: use it roll out the putty. Acrylic will allow some flex to remove the putty.
- Two-part epoxy putty: Aves Apoxie Sculpt is good but Ashley prefers Kneadatite with its yellow and blue components.
- Kneadatite has a working time of 1.5-2 hours and a cure time of 4-5 hours. Apoxie Sculpt has a 1-3 hour working time and cures in 24 hours.
- Both putties have a clay consistency and to use, equal parts are kneaded together for a few minutes until no color streaks remain. A little water helps prevent sticking and leaving fingerprints.

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Cut equal parts of each putty component from the log.



Knead together until no color streaks remain. Blue + Yellow = Green.



Roll the putty on acrylic sheet to get the rough shape and adjust the portion as needed to stay in scale.



Press the putty roll onto the model surface and make sure it sits flat. If you put down plastic wrap underneath, you can lift off the piece after it dries, for painting it separately.



Use a dental tool to make the spiral creases that are on each end of a bedroll.



Continue making end creases and also make the tail end of the bedroll as it flaps over the final layer.

Make an indentation for a strap. Your piece may have several straps that both hold the item together and attach it to the vehicle. Let references be your guide



Using a dental tool, make fabric folds, creases and tension marks.



Continue with the folds, creases and tension marks, as much as you wish. Try to consider the real material and how it would behave under tension.

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Make a strap using the same putty.



Roll the putty flat with a cylindrical tool handle.



Use a single-edge razor blade to make a first cut so it's perfectly straight.



Make another cut the width of the strap and pop the blade upward.



The strap material is on the blade edge.




Carefully lift the strap material off the razor blade with a hobby knife blade.

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Transfer the strap to the putty bedroll.



Press the strap in place using a dental tool.



Use stray strap ends if desired, depending on the material. Straps are commonly made of canvas or leather but can be other materials.



Make a strap buckle by first cutting out a square piece of putty.




Put the putty buckle in place on the existing strap.



Shape and define the buckle with a dental tool. Add creases around it if desired and you're done!

Italeri Italian Fiat 508 Coloniale in 1:35 scale by Brian Alfano

Brian painted the model with Italeri paint, which he was not previously aware of, but said it worked very well. He plans to use this model in a setting with a 1:32 Macchi airplane







"Recon Report" in 1:35 scale by David Vickers

The motorcycle is from Great Wall Hobby and was fragile but David mounted it to a stick during assembly and painting. The

building is made from plaster and is from Royal Model. The backside was completely bare so David scribed the bricks and added wooden frames and wallpaper. Loose bricks are plaster pieces from another kit and were selected to match the size of the building bricks. The workshop pieces are

from Custom Dioramics. The chipped paint on the soldier's helmets is done by sponging on Vallejo Black Grey. David likes to use an Raw Umber artists' oil wash on all the components to unify the different colors in the scene. He also likes to use Yellow Ochre to warm up the items that are white.



## Pass and Review from September



BattleMechs in 1:285 scale by Chip Heusinger Chip used Army Painter Speedpaint 2.0 paints, which when applied over a primer acts as the base, shadow and highlight in one-coat. On the bases, Games Workshop Crackle paint was used, which cracks when dry, depending on the thickness of the coat. Chip also used decals from Fighting Pirannha Graphics.

# Takom V-2 from "Operation Sandy" in 1:72 scale

Takom's kit has nice detail and includes the trailer, base and rocket but does not include the launching support rod. Several round parts were replaced with styrene rod to simplify the cleaning steps.







## Tamiya Soviet BT-7 in 1:35 scale by John Robinson

The BT-7 was ready for painting, so the base built before that was lost in the hurry to finish the project. A wooden plaque was

framed with .060" black styrene and then XPS foam insulation board was cut and shaped to form the basic ground contours. DAS air dry clay was then applied to build out the final groundwork. Before it was dry, small stones and gravel were pressed in and it was textured with a bristle brush. A large rock was simulated with hunk of pine bark. The grasses are various products from AK-Interactive and war gaming sets. The grasses appeared too "new' so the groundwork color was thinned heavily and airbrushed over the grass to make it blend. The figure is from Panzer Art.




AFV Club US M728 CEV in 1:35 scale by Scott Bregi

Scott said that only a few things are left before this can be called finished. MCI ration boxes are from Tamiya and a coffee mug was added, complete with an

AMPS logo. It was painted first with AK-Interactive's Real Color paint and then touched up with Mission Model paints.





## Hobby Link US M125 10-ton 6x6 in 1:35 scale by Glen Martin

The entire kit is 3D printed and comes with an engine and fully detailed suspension. As you can see from the parts below, many runners have to be removed before assembly, and this sometimes caused the parts to break. The chassis was molded as one piece but had a warp that prevented the model from sitting level. Glen tried hot water, but although the part could be straightened when warm, it would return to its warped state when cool. Glen had to resort to cutting out segments from the chassis and gluing it back with CA glue. Some parts have visible layer lines, especially the fuel tanks and bed parts. <u>Glen's AMPS review is here.</u>
